Ski Trip to Artesina, Italy

At 12:30am on Sunday 16th March, Mr Cockerill, Mrs Jones, Mr Brown, Mr South, Mrs Lee, Miss Harris, Mrs Dickin, plus 60 amazing students from years 8 - 10 embarked on, what would turn out to be, an incredible trip to ski in the Italian Maritime Alps. After a long journey to Turin Airport via Gatwick, we arrived mid afternoon in Artesina, part of the Mondole ski area at 1,500m – 2,600m in altitude. Boots and skis were fitted and we got acquainted with the resort.

Over the next 6 days our ski schedule was as follows;

10am - 12pm - Ski school with our amazing instructors

12pm - Lunch back at the hotel

2pm - 4pm - Ski school

6pm - Tea

7:30pm - Evening activities such as karaoke, disco, bum boarding and quiz nights.

Skill levels varied across the 6 groups however the majority of students had either never skied or had just had a few basic lessons on the dry ski slopes. Over the course of the week, progression was outstanding. Students learnt how to snowplough stop and turn, progressing to side slipping to parallel turning and carving. A huge dump of fresh snow on the pistes for Tuesday and then again on Saturday enabled most students to experience 'powder' skiing for the first time. Learning how to use chairlifts is not easy and eventually all of us mastered getting on and off with skis intact.

The ski instructors commended the school on the excellent attitude of our students and after our final session on the slopes the students were given report cards to show their amazing progress during the week. Many conquered extreme nerves and fears and seeing the faces of so many students marvelling at the stunning scenery and realising just what they had achieved was an experience that is impossible to put a value on.

This was more than just a ski trip. So many other life skills were learnt during this fantastic educational visit. Communication skills, conflict resolution, the ability to live in very close proximity to people of different ages and backgrounds, time management skills, trust, overcoming fear and being 'out of one's comfort zone' for long periods of time are just a few examples. Our students learnt to be considerate to other members of the public sharing the hotel, some of whom commented on how well mannered National students were. Many students were in awe of the scenery and for a few I believe it was also a 'spiritual' experience seeing the wonder of creation all around. The 'camaraderie' built up between students and staff was very special and unique.

As a staff we would like to thank the fantastic group of students who came with us. We are hugely grateful to the many kind parents who emailed their encouragements and support afterwards, and also to the school governors and members of the senior leadership team who gave the go ahead for this trip. We look forward to running many more ski trips in the future so that more students can take part in such a truly memorable and life affirming experience.

Year 8 Forensics Day

On Tuesday 4th February, 33 year 8 students took part in a forensic science day with Sci-High. During the full day workshop, they learned about the techniques that forensic scientists use in real life investigations, including handwriting analysis, blood spatter patterns, chromatography, scanning crime scenes with ultraviolet light and identifying suspects from descriptions. Later, they learned about the science of blood, cells and DNA and developed their skills in taking latent fingerprints using the same magnetic brushes and powder that would be used in a real crime scene.

In the afternoon, the students then tried out their drama skills by taking part in a mock trial, where they played the roles of a judge, suspects and barristers, and then decided whether they thought the suspects were guilty or not guilty, based on the evidence they had gathered. The students really benefited from this opportunity and it supported a lot of the subjects they study throughout the curriculum.

Big Question Week

On the week commencing Monday 10 March we had our Big Questions Week. This always provides students with an opportunity to ponder and question major topics through the lens of faith. This year the topic was compassion which is one of our ARCH values.

The week began with Mrs Dickin coming back to lead a session with each year group looking at the meaning of compassion and how it links with the work of the King's Village in Ghana which we as an academy support. It was lovely to hear the progress being made by the students that we sponsor and the impact that the work there is having on so many members of the community.

On the Wednesday, we were delighted to welcome the Bishop of Southwell and Nottingham, Paul Williams, to lead collective worship for year 10 and year 7. The message was recorded so that the other year groups could also listen later that week. He inspired and encouraged our students to look at the world with compassion, as Jesus did, and not to be overwhelmed by fear.

We were also visited by a member of Nottingham Street Pastors who led sessions for year 9 tutor groups about the work they do in the city centre at the weekends to support the night time economy which often involves helping people who are in need following an evening out. The students then thought about how they could show compassion on a daily basis.

There was an opportunity for some PE groups to engage with 'worshipcise' which was run by Jo, a Christian personal trainer. This proved to be an extremely popular and enjoyable, as well as tiring, workshop.

Our hope is that throughout the week students were able to think about which organisations show care for others both locally and nationally. This in turn may have led them to think how they can show compassion in the community through the way they speak and act.

Faculty Blog - Maths and Computing (MAC)

Boost to students' digital skills

We have been strengthening and developing our students digital skills by embedding Microsoft Teams and associated technologies into their lessons. This is to give them increased confidence and skills in the processes involved in using computers. In year 8, we have also introduced a basic skills curriculum to address the weaknesses that some students have through a heavy increase in the use of tablets and smartphones, rather than desktop computing. These skills will have an increased impact on their ability to use computer software across the curriculum and, later on, when they enter the workplace. The assignment below shows an excellent piece of year 9 work, where the students have been learning how to program the micro bit to learn coding skills; the assignment was submitted in Microsoft Teams, assessed and then returned to the student for revision, enabling high levels of progress in their learning.

Advent 1 Computer Science Assessment

10 October 2023 09:15

Task: Create a game which picks a random integer (whole number) between 1 and 10. The person playing the game should be able to input a number using the buttons on the <u>microbit</u>. When they press A&B it should output a smiling face if their guess matches the random number. Otherwise, it should output higher if the number is higher than their guess or lower.

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In maths we have continued our use of Sparx online learning platform, using this for homework for years 9, 10 and 11. Once the homework has been completed, students then use time in lessons to work on individual areas of need taken from the homework, and for those who would benefit from more challenging homework there are personalised challenge questions. We have also embedded this into our assessment cycle, students are given the Sparx codes before an assessment to help their independent learning outside of lessons in preparation for an assessment. Then after the assessment students go to a computer room, and then work on whichever areas they struggled on in the assessment, hence completing the assessment cycle. This is proving to have a big impact on students progress and confidence.

Since September, students at the National Academy have completed 4264 hours of learning on Sparx and answered 192,343 questions correctly. Our top 3 students so far this year are Hannah G, Niamh O, and Oliver S. Year 9 has the highest percentage of students with 100%.

Year 9

As we approach the end of the term, this newsletter marks my final communication with you as my maternity cover for Mrs Hopkin comes to an end at the beginning of the new term. It has truly been a pleasure working with such an enthusiastic group of students. I've watched year 9 grow in both academic ability and personal development, and I couldn't be prouder of all that they've achieved so far this year, and I am confident they are all set for the challenges to come in year 10.

I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to all of the year 9 students for their hard work, determination, and positive attitude. You have made my time as head of year challenging and rewarding in equal measures. I'd also like to thank the parents and guardians for the support over the past year. Year 10

Year 10 have had a very positive term in a very important academic year. Well done to 10B and 10C, leading the way with an average attendance over 94% this term. We have 109 year 10 students above our 97% target (over half the year group), with 50 students at 100% (about a quarter of the year group).

In lessons every student has received achievement points, as year 10 have collectively been awarded over 17,000 positive achievement points this term. 10G lead the way this term with over 6,000 positive achievement points. Mock exams will be starting for year 10 on Monday 16th June, and it is important that students start preparations early. Over Easter, they should ensure they are building a revision plan and begin revising regularly for their upcoming mock exams.
