Summer address from Mr Brailsford - Headteacher

I cannot believe we have already arrived at the end of another busy and successful school year. It only seems like yesterday that we were welcoming our new year 7s who are now almost year 8s. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support and partnership. It has been a year full of growth, learning, and community spirit — and we are incredibly proud of everything our community has achieved.

Together, we have overcome many challenges including heavy snow, local flooding, 3 heatwaves and our first ever real lockdown – which was handled superbly well by everyone at National. I am extremely thankful to you all for your support and understanding over the last year.

This year, we celebrated many milestones, including:

Achievement: Our students have continued to show resilience, curiosity, and dedication and again were a credit to the Academy and their families throughout the year. For the second year in a row our attendance is in the top 25% of all schools nationally.

Behaviour: The DfE released the data for the whole country this month and we have made our comparisons. In terms of suspensions, they went up nationally by 21% in only a year. That was not the case here. The best way to explain how positive our behaviour is, is to say that our year 11 were suspended 75% less than the National average. 7.86% of year 11s are suspended nationally and here it is below 2%. That shows how engaged our children are and how much value they place on their learning and education. Thank you for all of your support around our standards and expectations this year. Working together is making a real difference to the lives of our students.

School Events: We've enjoyed a wide range of events — from Hagg Farm, Rhineland, Yorkshire Sculpture Park, Yorkshire Wildlife Park and multiple Duke of Edinburgh expeditions to university visits, theatre trips, visiting the National Civil War Centre and also supporting the Lionesses in their 7-0 victory over Jamaica. Thank you to everyone who helped make these experiences and memories so special.

Performances and Creativity: Our school productions are always incredible and again showcased the incredible talent and confidence our students have. This year we had 'Back to the 80s' which was an absolute treat for me and was not only enjoyed by the cast but also by all of the supportive parents and generous members of our community.

Community Involvement: Our charity initiatives and community partnerships have taught our students valuable lessons in kindness and civic responsibility. Our community partnerships have included visiting and welcoming guests from our local care home and also supporting and volunteering at our local food bank.



Germany Trip

At midnight on Monday 7th July, 44 students and staff met to set off for a week in the Rhineland area of Germany. We travelled by coach and ferry to our home for the week, The Hotel Anker, where we were greeted once again like family by Renata, our host.

On day one, students completed a town trail in the neighbouring town of Boppard on the Rhine, where students had to answer clues and find information around the town in German and complete a secret extra mission to find Mrs Guests favourite snack, Jumpys. Later, we boarded the coach to Cochem, another picturesque town, but this time situated on the Moselle river. Despite travelling through heavy rain, the sun shone as we arrived and students nervously got on the chair lift, with stunning views over the town, river and the castle in the distance. Later, students enjoyed some shopping and tried some German specialities such as Currywurst and Spaghettieis. Then, we took a guided tour of the castle and learnt about its origins and history. A big well done to students (and some staff) for conquering their fear of heights! In the evening students completed a German themed quiz with Emily, Eling, Edith and Erinne being crowned winners!

Wednesday saw us visit the Deutsches Eck in Koblenz, where the Rhine and Moselle rivers meet. We visited the huge Wilhelm monument and took the Seilbahn up to the fortress to view the old town and the confluence from above. Lunchtime saw some stiff competition in "The Apprentice". Students received a list of 5 items and 10 euros to buy the items, as quickly and cheaply as possible, including the most random item they could find. We saw an array of items such as fly swatters, tweezers, scary cherubs and interesting fidget toys. There was a new school record this year as the fastest group completed this in just over 4 minutes and the cheapest was €4.80. Later, students had some time to relax as we took a cruise along the River Rhine, saw lots of castles and heard the story of the Lorelei – a beautiful siren, who whispered to the sailors to come closer and then made them crash into the rocks behind. After dinner, students and staff spent some time bowling. The competition was fierce with Charlie winning overall with an impressive score of 132. Well done!

A very early get up and coach ride on Thursday, saw the group visit the amazing city of Cologne. Firstly, students learnt about the origins of chocolate and saw a production line complete with tasters at the Schokolademuseum. Lots of lovely gifts were bought here for friends and family. After a short walk, students visited the UNESCO heritage site Kölner Dom (cathedral) which dominates the Cologne skyline and had some free time in the city. In the afternoon, a highlight for many was a tour of the Bayarena, which is the home of Bayer Leverkusen 04, who last year became the Bundesliga champions, but could not hold on to this title in 2025. Students were given a tour by 2 season ticket holders, were shown around the stadium seating, VIP lounges, dressing rooms and the tunnel leading to the pitch, which apparently is the best in Europe! Whilst there, the first team were training and students were able to have a sneaky peak. One group were able to see Boniface and the other group were awe-struck at meeting Hincapie who stopped for a photo. Students took part in a fabulous press conference in the press room, with Kyron stealing the show with his impersonation of Erik Ten Hag, the Bayer Leverkusen coach. To round up a great day in Cologne, we visited the Michael Schuhmacher collection which proudly displays all his cars and trophies and for the F1 fans, especially Mr Hunt, this was a real treat! The students enjoyed the trip, really embraced all the chances to speak German and took part in all activities enthusiastically.

Year 8 spent their day in groups exploring **Yorkshire Sculpture Park** and considering how spirituality may inspire art. 
Goodbye To Year 11

Year 10

Year 10 have had a very positive term at the end of a very important academic year. Well done to 10C and 10F, leading the way with an average attendance of over 95% this term. We have 102 year 10 students above our 97% target (over half the year group), with 49 students at 100% (about a quarter of the year group). In lessons every student has received achievement points, and year 10 have collectively been awarded over 13,000 positive achievement points this term. 10G have over 4,500 positive achievement points. Congratulations to Wisdom in 10A, Taylor in 10G, Ava in 10E, Kalia in 10G, Harley in 10F, Archie in 10E, Lauren in 10G, Jacob in 10B, Dylan in 10B, and Keyarna-Unique in 10D for being our top 10 most rewarded students in year 10 this term.

This term year 10 have experienced an exam season for the first time, with an intensive two weeks of mock exams in June. Mock exams are designed to be a learning opportunity, so whether students are pleased with or worried about their results, please encourage them to focus on identifying areas for improvement and creating a plan to address them.

We also have a significant number of year 10 students who have completed the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, showing a commitment to learning a new skill, taking part in a physical activity and volunteering, in addition to successfully completing their overnight expedition. Congratulations to all who have gained this award. There has also been significant success for the year 10 girls football team, who have come to the end of their four year journey together. Finally in their last game as a team they became county champions, winning 8-2 in the final. Huge congratulations ladies!

Well done to all year 10's for each of their positives this term, and enjoy the summer break.
