

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
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WELCOME TO NSFC








PAST SUCCESS

Ben and Zach enjoyed a productive and successful time at sixth form and have gone on to begin the exciting next chapters of their lives.

Zach studied Religious Studies, Maths and History and has continued to Durham university to study Philosophy. Ben studied Design Technology, Criminology and History and has now gone on to a fantastic apprenticeship with Amazon, securing the place against many hundreds of other applicants.

Both Ben and Zach also studied the EPQ – Extended Project Qualification which gave them the chance to specialise in a topic of their choosing, beyond the content of their chosen courses. As well as giving essential academic skills, this also allowed them to develop their project management skills.

In Zach's words:

"I originally joined the National Sixth Form Centre to be able to continue education with a cohort of students I was already familiar with being a National student, however joining the sixth form had many benefits I didn't initially consider.

The smaller cohort of students, both gave sixth form a community feel and meant that student support was personal and prioritised. This particularly shone through in their guidance for post-18 options, as not only were we given general guidance during enrichment sessions but also personalised support during form times. Both tutors and subject teachers were always willing to help, for me this support was given to my university application as I was given detailed feedback on my personal statement which made a real difference.

We were encouraged to take more responsibility for our own learning with independent study sessions, while also consistently being offered assistance through after school revision and teacher guidance. National sixth form not only supported me academically but also granted me the tools and skills I needed for adult life with work experience and CV curation, preparing me for higher education and beyond."

In Ben's words:

"I joined National Sixth Form in September 2023, drawn by the wide variety of subject choices and the supportive,

structured environment it offered. I felt encouraged to explore any future pathway, whether that was university, apprenticeships, or other opportunities. Personally, I chose to pursue an apprenticeship route and received guidance and support from my teachers throughout the process. This helped me successfully secure a mechatronics engineering apprenticeship.

Sixth Form gave me the independence and trust to take ownership of my learning but also offered support when needed. With hard work, perseverance, and the encouragement of my teachers, I achieved A grades across all my subjects."

In Jacob's words

Following a fantastic set of A Level results in Biology, History, Mathematics and EPQ, Jacob has progressed to Oxford University to read Law. Jacob fully embraced life within the sixth form, being a regular sight studying in our LRC and serving in the Student Leadership Team as a Head Student.

Jacob tells us that "Sixth Form were extremely supportive and encouraging of a healthy balance between academic workload, extra-curricular opportunities and our social lives. This has enabled me to grow into a more well rounded student and person."

He concludes that studying as a member of the sixth form has given him "the tools to succeed throughout the University application and interview process, setting me up for University life and to excel in my life outside of academics.





In Odetta's words

Odetta enjoyed a successful time at sixth form, she was one of our Student Presidents and after achieving great results in History, English Literature, Psychology and EPQ has progressed to Oxford University to read History.

Odetta said: "It was a comfort to study alongside my friends from National Academy and meet new people from other schools. Alongside academics, there were also opportunities for development outside the classroom. As a Student President I was able to represent Sixth form in the wider community and as a school magazine contributor, I discussed topics I was passionate about."

She goes on to conclude that "The environment at Sixth Form was thoroughly engaging, warm and welcoming. The full support of everyone at Sixth Form meant I got an offer from my dream university."

Odetta's advice for future students is to "make the most of the two years by getting involved with the wider school community and taking every opportunity that is available. Teachers are always ready to extend support at every opportunity, so my advice for new students would be to ask for help whenever they find themselves struggling or otherwise."

THE EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION



Students at NSFC will complete an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) as part of ongoing development and study. The EPQ is highly valued by universities and employers as evidence of a range of transferrable skills required for higher education and employment.



the EPQ. students have the opportunity to choose their OW/n topic area to research, ideally linked to future studies or career aspirations. Students will produce either a 5,000 word research dissertation on their topic or they will develop an artefact with a 2,000 word research report. They will then plan, research, develop and evaluate their project throughout the year. This is supported by sessions which build on skills such as independent study and research, organisation, time management, presentation skills and reflection.

Successful past dissertation EPQ projects include diverse projects on business marketing, psychological and biological research into Alzheimer's and autism, causes of the Spanish Civil War, causes of the 2008 economic crash, and the development of paramedic science and dentistry. Examples of excellent artefact EPQ projects include architectural design, jewellery making, photography, creative writing and computer programming.

The EPQ will give you a sense of achievement, an opportunity for individual research on a topic you are interested in and a very valuable qualification for inclusion on UCAS or job applications.



STUDENT ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Within the academy and sixth form we strive to ensure that all members of the National community experience 'life in all its fullness'. It is important that students have a diverse range of experiences beyond their academic programme.

All students will have one session of timetabled enrichment in which we invite external speakers in to deliver inspiring and informative sessions. These offer thought provoking discussion, reflection and independent research, and have previously included safe driving, the importance of voting, banking, higher education and alcohol awareness.

Beyond these sessions our enrichment programme includes opportunities such as:

- Academy service
- Clubs and societies
- Social action projects
- Student leadership

Linked to a number of courses are opportunities to experience new cultures and environments, and to discover how you can apply your studies in real life contexts. We arrange visits throughout the year, both in the UK and further afield.

In year 12, you will complete work experience related to your career of choice or the education pathway you wish to follow. You will be expected to select, apply and interview for roles, and represent both yourself and National Sixth Form Centre in a professional, business-like manner.

EXTENDED SIXTH FORM OFFER

NATIONAL CHURCH OF FINGLAND

In order to strengthen and diversify opportunities for young people in Hucknall, the National Sixth Form Centre and The Holgate Sixth Form have formed a collaborative partnership between their respective sixth forms.

The goal of the partnership is to maximise the opportunities for all 16-19 students by ensuring they have access to the broadest possible curriculum, whether this is a purely academic route or a mix of vocational and academic subjects.

A unique feature of the partnership is that each school or academy retains /its independent identity and ethos. Students gain the advantage of belonging to an institution which will support them through the sixth form and give them all necessary pastoral care and tutorial support whilst utilising the partnership to give them a more extensive range of opportunities.

In order to study at NSFC we expect students to have achieved a minimum of five grade 5 qualifications at GCSE in subjects relevant to their choices at sixth form. Students must also have at least a Grade 4 in English and Maths.

Art - fine

Chemistry

(A Level)

The course will develop your interest in and enthusiasm for chemistry, learning about how the world works and the application of science.

You will study organic and inorganic chemistry, discovering molecules used for fuels and medicine, finding out how these can be engineered and adapted, learning about elements and compounds, and expanding your knowledge of physical chemistry – the fundamental laws of nature that govern everything we are.

The course is a mixture of theoretical and practical work, developing your skills and techniques alongside solid base knowledge. Onward destinations for students at higher education include science-based subjects such as medicine, pharmacology and chemical engineering.

(A Level)

Computer science provides a framework within which you can consider complex problems and apply computational methods to create effective and efficient solutions. Contemporary computer science issues such as the legal, moral, cultural and ethical issues associated with computer systems are also explored.

The course will enable you to analyse problems and critically evaluate solutions in a changing world. Students can move on to higher education courses relating to computer programming, systems analysis and careers in web development and STEM related industries.

English literature

(A Level)

English literature is the study of how we engage with and think about the world – cultures, human relationships, history and the history of ideas. This course allows learners to undertake independent and sustained studies to deepen the appreciation and understanding of literature, including its changing traditions. You must engage with ideas in the subject matter and explore how they are presented. Enthusiastic involvement with discussion is essential. Apply your knowledge of literary analysis and evaluation, critically and creatively across texts. You will also explore ideas and actively discuss these with other students, developing your interest in and enjoyment of literature.

Students will study a unit of tragedy which includes a Shakespearean tragedy, a modern play and a 19th century novel. The second unit will explore 'Elements of political and social protest writing' and includes the study of a post 2000 novel, a collection of poetry and a pre-1900 play. You will also complete an independent study of a prose and poetry texts applying critical theory to deepen your evaluation of your chosen text.

Applied law is an engaging course providing students with an introduction to the legal sector.
