
SUMMER READS


Becoming Muhammad by Kwame Alexander and James Patterson



fight the darkness and protect those she loves. A well-written and compelling story with a feisty yet believable heroine.






Look Both Ways by Jason Reynolds


The Invasion of Crooked Oak by Dan Smith Barrington Stoke


The Strangeworlds Travel Agency by L.D Lapinski


Boy Everywhere by A. M. Dassu

In a dangerous future, huge motorized cities hunt, attack and fight each other for survival.


As London pursues a small town, young apprentice Tom is flung out into the wastelands, where a terrifying cyborg begins to hunt him down.




Lark by Anthony McGowan Barrington Stoke


Year 9

The Fault in Our Stars by John Green







Warcross by Marie Lu






Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller

knowing that the years that follow will test everything they hold dear. Very popular on BookTok.


Run Rebel by Manjeet Mann

A good girl's guide to murder by Holly Jackson


The case is closed. Five years ago, schoolgirl Andie Bell was murdered by Sal Singh. The police know he did it. Everyone in town knows he did it.


Wranglestone by Darren Charlton
